### > Keeping things moving

As a consequence of the globalised movement of goods, the pressure on businesses to compete and fulfill increasingly exacting customer requirements has grown steadily. An impossible feat – without perfect logistics. This is where the Hamburg metropolitan region offers companies an ideal environment.

Its geographic location and excellent accessibility by water, surface, rail and air make Hamburg an important logistical link in world trade as well as Northern Europe's prime logistics location.

This cosmopolitan city on the water is the easternmost port on the North Sea and at the same time, the ideal gateway to Eastern Europe. As a global hub connecting the world with Central and Eastern Europe and the entire Baltic region, Hamburg benefits from its central position as a vital transshipment link for Europe.

## Hamburg — Excellent Connections



### > The Hamburg metropolitan region provides a superb transport infrastructure

No other European logistics location with a seaport is as perfectly embedded in a high-capacity transport network.

- The railway system is the backbone for a significant share of the transports.
   Hamburg is the most important railway hub in Northern Europe.
- An efficient and expansive motorway network capable of accommodating the nation's most substantial increases in goods traffic.
- Centrally located Hamburg Airport ensures fast air freight handling in all segments.
- A multitude of feeder and river shipping lines connect Hamburg with the hinterland and the states of the Baltic region via the North and Baltic Seas, the Elbe River and inland waterways.
- The ports in the Hamburg metropolitan region, such as Brunsbüttel and Stade, complete the range of available trimodal sites.

### > Hamburg relies on intelligent growth

- Hamburg is determined to advance a kind of mobility that is both sustainable and compatible with the urban environment – this includes the port, where, for example, waterborne container taxis have replaced trucks as a means of transferring containers between harbour terminals.
- Economic and scientific research today focusses strongly on the logistics sector, e.g. on alternative propulsion systems and electromobility.
- The Hamburg Senate (state government)
  will continue its drive to modernise the
  infrastructure, focusing firmly on sustainability and enabling the Port of Hamburg to
  maintain and strengthen its position among
  the world's leading harbours.
- Companies ready for growth will find attractive real estate in the Hamburg metropolitan region for relocation or expansion.
   In addition, the share of 'recycled' land and converted real estate will increase significantly in the years ahead.

Likewise, a large number of private and stateowned institutions provide advanced vocational training to ensure that those working in the logistics sector are well equipped to meet increasingly stringent job specifications. The overall result is a vast pool of highly qualified personnel and an asset that gives locally based companies a competitive edge.

#### > Steady growth in the Hamburg metropolitan region

Relative to its total population, Hamburg has the highest number of new companies founded in any region of Germany. The Hamburg metropolitan region is also an attractive base for foreign firms.

For example, more Chinese companies have located in Hamburg than in any other city on the European continent. Hamburg is the main port for shipping to and from the Far East, and China's gateway to Europe. The largest Asian economy is the Port of Hamburg's most important trading partner – with growth rates well above average. Thus, it comes as no surprise that the seven major liner shipping companies from China, Japan, Korea and Taiwan have opted for Hamburg.

In Hamburg, they are in the company of the top league of logistics service providers – with an impressive agglomeration of global logistics players managing the massive trade flows from all continents.
